



From St. Luke's Vicar

We have left the stressful, sad, and often tragic old year behind us and begin 2023 fresh with hope, love, and promise. Don't bring the troubles of the past into this new beginning.

"You've done your best, trust God to transition you with His Grace." (*Shelby Condo Kelly's Treehouse*) As we celebrate the gift of the Christ-child let us remember that we are reflections of Jesus' love.

"St. Paul says that when people bog down in their prayers, 'the Spirit himself intercedes for us with sighs too deep for words' (Romans 8:26). The time he outdid himself, of course, was when 'he so loved the world that he gave his only Son that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life' (John 3:16). To put it another way, his final word to the world was the Word itself, wearing flesh like a uniform and dwelling among us full of grace and truth (John 1:14)." Frederick Buechner from *Peculiar Treasures*, a *Biblical Who's Who*, p 201.

The Feast of the Manifestation, or Epiphany, is traditionally celebrated the 12th day after Christmas, January 6th. In the Episcopal and Catholic dioceses of the United States, according to the new calendar, this feast has been moved to the Sunday between January 2 and January 8, if the 6th falls during the week. For us, this year, it is on January 8th.

On Epiphany (Twelfth Night), St. Luke's marks the occasion of a time-honored Christian tradition of "chalking the doors." The formula for the ritual...adapted for 2023...is simple: take chalk (blessed by the priest) of any color and write the following above the entrance to the church or your home: 20 + C + M + B + 23

The letters have two meanings. First, they represent the Magi---we have come to know them as Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar---who came to visit Jesus in his first home. They also abbreviate the Latin phrase, *Christus mansionem benedicat:* "May Christ bless the house." The + sign represents the cross, and the 20 at the beginning and the 23 at the end mark the year. Taken together, this inscription is performed as a request for Christ to bless those homes (and churches)

so marked and that He stay with those who dwell or worship therein throughout the entire year.


The chalking of the doors is a centuries-old practice throughout the world, though it appears to be somewhat less well-known in the United States. It is, however, an easy tradition to adopt, and a great practice whereby we dedicate our year to God from its very outset, asking his blessing on our homes and churches and on all who live, work, or visit them there.

Our homes are where many of us will make the greatest strides in our spiritual growth, through observance of daily prayer, spiritual reading, and work offered as an oblation to God. Seeing the symbols over our doors can help to remind us that our homes and all those who dwell there belong to Christ. It also serves as reminder of welcoming all those who come to our homes and church to visit us!

Blessed chalk will be available for parishioners to take home and mark their doors.

God bless you and keep you.

From The Deacon's Bench

December was an incredibly busy month for this Deacon. Yet, it was probably the most fulfilling month I can remember. Thanks to all three churches, nineteen refugee children and their families received presents, surprising them with items they probably never expected. In case you didn't know this, our idea of a giving tree spurred Interfaith Rise to have a giving tree for ALL of the refugee children they are helping. We collected and delivered gifts to 2 Afghan families and 2 Ukrainian families. Mother Antoinette and I delivered the gifts to one of the Ukrainian families and I think the grandmother who received them was overwhelmed. Their Case Manager, Zoryana, told me they were in tears with the generosity. I got to meet a couple of the Afghan children – 4 year old Zeyneb, who was very shy and 14 year old Sanga, who received the presents for her family. In addition I returned to the Nesterenko family because I forgot a necklace for Diana and had a lovely conversation with the whole family. Tymofii, age 2, came right to me showing me his action figure and Diana (14) has become quite fluent in English at Quinton Schools, with the help of John Wernega, a friend of St. John's. It was lovely.

In addition to all of this activity, St. John's held their annual Secret Santa Shoppe and had over 90 local children 'shop' in the store for gifts for their family members. Many many people from both St. George's and St. John's made this happen and it was a huge success! We were nearly wiped out of gift items so start collecting those items that you'd like to donate for next year and we'll store them. As you put your Christmas decorations away, if there are items you are not using any longer don't toss them, give them to me.

I was also given another family – a Guatemalan mother and her 2 boys, age 10 and 5, who live in Penns Grove. Through many generous donations, I have been able to give her kitchen supplies, pots and pans, a brand new bunk bed for the boys and Christmas presents that included a brand new bike for the 10 year old. I will continue to support them and try to get things for them to help them with their life here. My Spanish has been

greatly challenged as they speak very little English – the 10 year old has had to translate for me!

Now onward to 2023 – I need your old hats, gloves, scarves and warm clothing. St. John's is gifted with a marvelous wrought iron fence around the property and each year we 'hang out' warm clothing. We will be putting these items out on Jan. 22nd so now's the time to sort your winter clothes and get me any items you wish to donate. Please don't go out and buy a lot of new stuff – gently used is great. If you have time to stop at a thrift store, those items are also appreciated.

We are the hands and feet of Christ. We are the image of Christ that the world sees. We are identifying the needs of the world and addressing them. God bless you all for your walk in Christ.


